Faithful Citizenship

The recent statement, *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship: A Catholic Call to Political Responsibility from the Catholic Bishops of the United States* (2007), discusses the moral dimensions of public policies and the responsibility that all Catholics share to form their consciences in light of their faith.

Participation in elections is one of the many ways that Catholics serve as active, informed citizens. Catholics are encouraged to make their voices heard in the public arena on an ongoing basis by discussing the issues, communicating with elected officials, and influencing public opinion through the media.
